

TOSS-UP

Her longtime slogan "Garibi Hatao" (gah-REE-bee hah-TOU) -- "Out with Poverty!" -- set the populist tone for her entire electoral career that culminated in 15 years as prime minister of the largest nation ever led by a woman. For 10 points -- who was this Indian leader?

ANSWER: INDIRA GANDHI

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TOSS-UP

Originally a tactic of survival -- northern Europeans skied to hunt for food, and later skied with weapons to defend their countries -- it's been on the Olympic program since 1960. For 10 points - name this sport, from the Greek for "two contests," that combines skiing and riflery.

ANSWER: BIATHLON

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TOSS-UP

By 1790 this birthplace of Nathaniel Hawthorne was one of the 12 largest communities in the U.S. Apparently its growth wasn't hindered by its most notorious events 100 years previous. For 10 points -- what is this Massachusetts town where trials were held for witches?

ANSWER: SALEM, MASSACHUSETTS

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TOSS-UP

Its dramatic types include post-hypnotic, lacunar (lah-KY00-nur), anteretrograde (an-TER-oh-grade) and retrograde, the last of which is a time-tested device of soap opera writers. For 10 points -- what is this loss of memory that can occur as a result of brain injury?

ANSWER: AMNESIA (am-NEEZ-yah or am-NEE-zhuh)

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TOSS-UP

After a remarkable 80-year odyssey of its own, the handwritten manuscript of its "Circe" (SEER-see) section was rediscovered in 2000 and auctioned by Christie's of New York. For 10 points - name this long, enigmatic and long-banned 1922 novel.

ANSWER: ULYSSES

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TOSS-UP

This two-syllable noun has lost its original Yiddish meaning of one so inept at making furniture that he might as well do it with an axe. For 10 points -- what is this noun now used for those very adept at breaking into computers?

ANSWER: HACKERS

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TOSS-UP

In an April 2001 referendum, its voters overwhelmingly rejected a proposed state flag featuring 20 white stars on a blue square with red and white stripes to the right and below. For 10 points -- name this Gulf coast state whose flag displays the Confederate battle emblem.

ANSWER: MISSISSIPPI

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TOSS-UP

His famous statue in London's Hyde Park was secretly constructed in a studio and installed at night so that children might believe it had appeared by magic. That was at the insistence of his literary creator J. M. Barrie. For 10 points -- who is this character?

ANSWER: PETER PAN

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TOSS-UP

The one mentioned in Genesis "went forth to and fro," and never returned to Noah's Ark. The ones mentioned in First Kings fed Elijah in the desert. For 10 points -- name this type of bird, and do it now, not nevermore.

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TOSS-UP

At 37 square miles, it is the second-smallest of Greece's Ionian islands but is probably the best known. For 10 points -- what is this island that's lent its name to an upstate New York college town and that was the home port of Ulysses?

ANSWER: ITHACA

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TOSS-UP

By some standards, he was a failure. His investors bailed, he barely found gold, and he never discovered the western route to Asia, the whole purpose of his most famous 15th century trip. On the plus side, who - for 10 points -- is credited with "discovering" America?

ANSWER: CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS

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TOSS-UP

Its three major allotropes (AL-uh-trohps) are all odorless, but its dioxide has a suffocating odor, and its most common compound with hydrogen smells like rotten eggs. For 10 points -- name this common solid but non-metallic element.

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TOSS-UP

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TOSS-UP

In Native American mythology, it was the chief animal of the pre-human age. As it is nocturnal and cunning, law enforcement uses it to nickname modern smugglers who traffic in illegal immigrants. For 10 points -- what is this animal that also names an NHL franchise in Phoenix?

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TOSS-UP

It was founded in 1958, nearly went bankrupt in the 1990s, but has recovered enough to begin building, in 2001, the largest U.S. building devoted exclusively to dance. For 10 points -- identify this dance company named for its African American founder.

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TOSS-UP
