2. What singer's 1938 radio broadcast that premiered Irving Berlin's "God Bless America"?

**ANSWER: KATE SMITH**

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**20 POINT BONUS**

Only two species of mammals have reproduced their way off of the U.S. Endangered Species List -- one in 1994 and the other in 2003. Each is popularly known as the "Gray" species of its genus. For 10 points -- give me the usual names of those two species formally known as *Eschrichtius robustus* (esh-RIK-tee-us roh-BUS-tus) and *Canis lupus* (KAY-nis LOO-pus).

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### 30 POINT BONUS

Of the 10 chemicals most produced in the U.S., three are pure elements -- at least 24 billion pounds of each being produced each year. For 10 points apiece -- name those two atmospheric gases and that deadly gas first used as a chemical weapon by Germany in World War I.

Since 1954, Egypt has had only three presidents. For 10 points apiece -- name them.

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**20 POINT BONUS**

The 20 nations with the highest Islamic populations are, with just two exceptions, predominantly Islamic nations. That's how Mali (MAH-lee) and Tunisia make the top-20 list. For 10 points apiece -- what two Asian nations have distinctly minority Islamic populations of 109 million and 29 million, respectively?

**ANSWER:** INDIA
